

COIN HOARDS FROM THE BRITISH ISLES 2016

EDITED BY RICHARD ABDY AND MARTIN ALLEN

BETWEEN 1975 and 1985 the Royal Numismatic Society published summaries of coin hoards from the British Isles and elsewhere in its serial publication *Coin Hoards*, and in 1994 this was revived as a separate section in the *Numismatic Chronicle*. In recent years the listing of finds from England, Wales and Northern Ireland in *Coin Hoards* was principally derived from reports originally prepared for publication in the *Treasure Annual Report*, but the last hoards published in this form were those reported under the 1996 Treasure Act in 2008. In 2012 it was decided to publish summaries of hoards from England, Wales, Scotland, the Isle of Man, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland and the Channel Islands in the *British Numismatic Journal* on an annual basis.

The hoards are listed in two sections, with the first section consisting of summaries of Iron Age and Roman hoards, and the second section providing more concise summaries of medieval and post-medieval hoards. In both sections the summaries include the place of finding, the date(s) of discovery, the suggested date(s) of deposition, and the number allocated to the hoard when it was reported under the terms of the Treasure Act (in England and Wales) or the laws of Treasure Trove (in Scotland). For reasons of space names of finders are omitted from the summary of medieval and post-medieval hoards. Reports on most of the English and Welsh hoards listed are available online from the Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) website: select the 'Search our database' bar under finds.org.uk/database, and type in the treasure case number without spaces (e.g. 2013T680).

Iron Age and Roman hoards

1. Linwood, Lincs, Apr. 2015 (2015 T252)

Dep.: 2nd century BC or later.

Contents: Two late Iron Age silver coins. Both are southern Gaulish *monnaies-a-la-croix* in the ‘Languedoc style’ (3.22 g and 3.32 g).

Note: PAS ID: LIN-67DD94. Fewer than ten of these types of coins have been found in Britain. See GLO-DB0008 and GLO-0C12F8 for other examples recorded on PAS.

2. Great Bromley district, Essex, Feb.–Mar. 2014 (2014 T685, addenda to 2013 T256)

11. Drifffield Area, East Yorks., Nov. 2015 (2015 T836, addenda to 2002 T92; 2003 T401; 2004 T468; 2006 T26; 2007 T48; 2007 T597)

Contents: A single gold *stater* North Eastern (Corieltavi) uninscribed gold *stater* (5.5 g).

Note: PAS ID: YORYM-8CE204. Addendum to a large, scattered hoard of Corieltavian *stater*s, known as the 'Drifffield Hoard', discovered over the course of six years; now standing at 66 coins (not including earlier finds seen in trade). A separate smaller hoard, the 'North Dalton Hoard' was also found in close proximity and reported as 2006 T494 and 2007 T600.

Dep.: c.10 BC or later.

Contents: Eight Iron Age silver units and base silver *stater*s: four Danebury silver units: *ABC* 887, 1.06 g; *ABC* 866, 0.81 g and 0.84 g; *ABC* 887 var., 1.06 g; four base silver *stater*s (Uninscribed South Western 'Durotriges' *ABC* 2160–72): 4.79 g, 2.74 g, 5.86 g and 3.44 g.

Note: PAS ID: HAMP-D2F4CC. For *ABC* 887 var. (boar obv., cf. *ABC* 869 but retrograde) / see BM 2012.4064.1. Possible dispersed hoard from a productive field adjacent to Danebury hillfort which has yielded many Iron Age coins. During metal detecting in the 1980s to the immediate south of this area a number of Iron Age coins were discovered of similar types to these (some subsequently acquired by the British Museum and Hampshire Cultural Trust). These coins were examined by Van Arsdell who suggested they may be from a dispersed hoard, a market or shrine (Cunliffe and Poole 1991, 320–8). Parts of this area were excavated in 1987 by Barry Cunliffe to see if there were any features associated with the coins but none were found (David Allen, *pers. comm.*, Oct. 2015).
